




NAME	SHAPE IN SUMMER & WINTER	LEAF, BUDS AND SEED	DESCRIPTION
			<p>This tree is also known as Mountain Ash or 'The Lady of the Mountain'. The colourful berries contain seeds that are poisonous to children. However songbirds like thrushes love the berries and will often sing for hours after feasting on these. In the past the tree was associated with magic.</p>
			<p>This blossom of this small tree is sometimes called 'may' because in this month the trees are covered in the sweet smelling flowers. It is most commonly seen used as a hedgerow tree and can withstand harsh weather conditions. Birds love to eat the red berries, called 'haws'.</p>
			<p>This tree comes in a large number of different varieties, including weeping, white, crack, grey, and goat. It is a common tree of wet places and riversides.</p>
			<p>This is the only broadleaved tree to produce cones. Its wood is strong, durable and impervious to water. As a result, it was used to build boats, bridges, canal lock gates, and jetties as well as the soles of clogs. It grows on river and stream sides.</p>
			<p>There are not many of these fully grown trees left now because a fungus introduced by a beetle brought from Holland in the 1970s killed most of them. The leaves feel rough and hairy to the touch.</p>
			<p>This tree was not originally a native of this country. It was introduced by the Romans because they enjoyed its nuts. Many of these trees were planted in the local woodlands because it is easily coppiced and the poles used for fencing. It has long narrow leaves and the trunk has twisted bark.</p>
			<p>This grows to be the tallest tree in Britain. Branches sprout all the way down the trunk. It has been planted all along many Sheffield streets. The flowers are very sweet smelling and attract insects and bees. The wood is very good for carving.</p>
