CHILDREN MIGHT MISS:


Environment A medicines and religious/cultural objects made from wood.
Environment B safe paths across marshy land are made using hazel hurdles, as at Glastonbury in the Iron Age (the remains are in the Woodspring Museum at Weston-super-Mare).
Environment C underground water stores can be lined with palm leaves.
Environment D potential for developing tourism/winter sports.



ACTIVITY 1

Different structures are suited to different local materials or climatic conditions. A close study of the structure and materials used in the "Homes Around the World", a set of wall charts from Macdonald Pictorial Education, could make for an additional activity. Ethnic minority children may have a lot to contribute. Encourage them to find out more from older relatives. They can then share their information with everyone.
